Electric vehicle demand supercharges lithium prices - Excerpt from the RBC Global Insight Daily newsletter

The gradual end to lockdowns has unleashed a wave of pent-up demand for electric vehicles that has pared down surplus stocks of the metal, while governments have emerged from recessions with pledges to invest in clean-energy projects. "The whole dynamic is completely changed," said David Archer, chief executive of Savannah Resources. While battery-powered vehicles were once regarded as a niche product, they are now seen as the future of transport, providing solid future demand for lithium, Archer continued. Chinese electric-vehicle sales more than tripled in January from a year earlier, according to the China Association of Automobile Manufacturers. In Europe, sales of alternatively powered cars, which include those that use batteries, biofuels and hybrids, eclipsed those of diesel-engine vehicles for the first time in Q3 2020 and now account for a third of new passenger cars, according to the European Automobile Manufacturers' Association.

While this news is a great indicator of how much traction is being gained in EV adoption worldwide, it may also indicate a potential for battery shortages and price increases in the near future as the industry adapts to the demand.

DUDE! Where's my rebate?
